That's My Boat

Each edition of the MainSHEET will feature a boat profile of a CRSA member.

Hey, Chris Bollinger, tell us about your boat!

I am told that my first time in a sailboat (with my parents) was at 11 months or so, while still in diapers. My family had a small "dory" wooden sailboat that my parents learned to sail on. At about age 5, my parents bought a 20' O'day Mariner (pocket cabin) and that's where I really began to learn to sail, racing in the Tuesday Night Series on Lake St. Claire in the Detroit area.

My current boat, named Halcyon, is a Flying Scot which I've sailed nearly exclusively at Cave Run. Flying Scots are one of the most successful daysailer boats around. At just under 20 feet, they are large enough to take out the whole family, but manageable to sail single handedly or with 1 or 2 crew members. My sloop rig is also configured for a spinnaker, which I love to fly! The boat was designed by Sandy Douglass, who also designed the Thistle (another very popular daysailer) and the Highlander.

I bought the boat, used, in the fall of 2001, shortly after getting tenure at UK. My goal, all along, was to sail with my kids, as my parents had with us. I raised my daughter Beth and son Thomas to love sailing – and especially racing – with the great group at Cave Run Lake.

After an initial set of work cleaning and varnishing, maintenance has been minimal. Indeed at times I have joked that I really need to rename the boat "Deferred Maintenance." The two biggest things that I have done were to replace the halyards and



halyard winches and repair some dings (mostly from docking) to my hull. I probably should spend more time on it, but that means less time sailing, so why would I?

It's been a great boat to sail, and I hope to continue to sail it well into the future! That's my boat!



Fiberglass Class By Jon Ware

This past April the Cave Run Sailing Association offered a multi-week workshop in Fiber-glass and Gelcoat repair. Ten participants, with some coming as far away as Cincinnati, took part in the class. Thanks to each of these folks, much needed repairs were completed in short order to the Cave Run Youth Sailing Academy's Sunfish fleet. All in all, six boats were repaired and given fresh Gelcoat. Participants learned about cloth and matting types, polyester resin, epoxy resin, and Gelcoat application. To ensure compatibility the repairs were completed using the Total Boat family of products. A special thanks goes out to Total Boat for providing a generous \$500 grant for the materials.

The workshop took place at Grimes Mill Farm, just outside of Lexington, Kentucky. Chas Martin, the owner of Grimes Mill Farm, allowed the club to use his farm's indoor equestrian arena to complete the work on the boats. Without his hospitality and this sheltered space the workshop would not have been possible. **Many, many thanks Mr. Martin!**



While it was wonderful to have the Sunfish fleet spit-shined, even better was the chance to build relationships and share knowledge gleaned from our own DIY projects. Participants came away better equipped to make repairs to their own vessels and with closer ties to the area's larger sailing community.
