News and Notes from the 43rd Grand Annual Regatta

Only two weeks to go until CRSA's 43rd Grand Annual Regatta, coming up on Saturday and Sunday, September 24 and 25! This is our big year end outdoor event! While sailing the races is highly encouraged, you do not have to race to join the fun. Register as a Guest and enjoy the meals, camaraderie, and entertainment on Saturday and stay for breakfast Sunday. There are several tent sites still available and room to park a camper (although eclectic hookup is limited), starting Friday afternoon at the Boat Gunnel. We have some room for a few guests on a pontoon boat serving as a second safety boat, so you might be a spectator on the lake! If you think you may want to crew on a boat, but don't know who to ask, let us know and maybe we can find an opportunity. If you are there as a guest, a crew opportunity may arise - you never know when the wind may pick up!

Thanks to the thirteen captains and seven guests who have registered so far! Along with signed-up crew, that makes 33 people coming as of Sept. 9. Getting those registrations in saves time for everyone and, importantly, helps us plan for meals. Please complete your registration today HERE!

Speaking of meals, our admiral for all things food at this year's Grand Annual is Regina Heiser, already very busy with preparations. This from Reg:

"Saturday enjoy a continental breakfast of assorted yogurts, hard boiled eggs, fresh fruit, savory and sweet quick breads, orange juice and coffee. Sunday morning be ready to power up with homemade cheese blintzes topped with your choice of blueberry compote, maple syrup or cinnamon applesauce, breakfast sausage, fresh fruit, orange juice, and coffee. Pack your lunch on Saturday with a deli sandwich, apple or orange, chips, chocolate chip cookie or brownie and, if you really need a boost, a cocoa pistachio almond chopped cherry energy ball to enjoy on the water."


A note on drinks: iced tea and lemonade will be available in bulk for dinner and lunch. Please bring your own drinking cups/mugs, bottles, or whatever you like to cart your beverage about. This will save the club some expense and is the "Green" thing to do! If you prefer sodas or bottled water, of course bring all you like.

Please take a minute to read the Notice of Race for much useful information. This information, which can be found on the CRSA website, includes a brief schedule of events and a listing of area hotels.

Just released is the Sailing Instructions (SI) for this year's Regatta. You can find this information on the website under Events & News, Regattas, Grand Annual Regatta. Our U.S. Sailing Race Official this year is Paul While from Indianapolis. He will be staying in his camper at the Boat Gunnel, so please make a point to say hello and make him welcome.

Sailors, please read the SI, some of which will be a change from our regular race series. For example, on the windward-leeward course, the starting line will move from near the leeward mark for the first race, to the center, then near the windward mark for the final race of the day. The starting line will be to the port side of the RC boat, while the finish line will be to starboard of the RC. The flag for the second class to start will go up when the first class's flag comes down (race start). In other words, the next class countdown from 4 min begins when the previous class starts, with no time in between. All boats must have "a unique number or other identification on the mainsail." If you don't, something homemade with that blue painter's masking tape should do the trick. These instructions should help the races to move along, so become familiar, and ask Paul any questions at the skipper's meeting at 10:30 Saturday and 8:00 on Sunday.

We ordered 60 shirts; 36 are taken to date. At some point we may run out of your size, so get registered!

That's My Boat

Each edition of the MainSHEET will feature a boat profile of a CRSA member.

Tony and Cherri Stansbury, tell us about your boat!

My first sailing experience was in the spring of 2019. I began to search for sailing opportunities locally and soon learned about the CRSA. At the age of 51, I signed up for the spring beginner class. Soon afterward I purchased a Sunfish to get some practice on what I was learning in class. Needless to say, I was hooked. At the time, it was customary that the students from the beginner class accompany a skipper for the Spring Charity Regatta. I was very fortunate to join Lou on his MC Scow. I got to experience a real racing boat and the adrenaline rush of heeling and moving at "high rates of speed". We (Lou) placed first in the regatta and I actually got to be in the first place picture.

Next, I purchased a Chrysler Mutineer 15 and started attending all the club races that I could. Everyone was so patient dealing with the "nubie". Perhaps my favorite memory that first year was Valerie (RC) asking me in the kindest way if I would like to finish the race or just come on in so we could start the next race. Of course I had been lapped by everyone and wasn't making much progress toward finishing. Starting the next race was a

really good suggestion. I finished out the first year and even skippered my own Mutt 15 in the Grand Annual.

Cherri and I currently sail a Catalina 25 fin keel that we have owned for 3 years. "Into the Mystic" has been a very forgiving and enjoyable boat and we have certainly been able to improve our sailing skills. Tom Wilson, the previous owner, had done a lot of work on the hull and all of the brightwork and had "Mystic" looking great. We continued

improvements by adding a 4 spring Motor mount from

Catalina Direct to hold the new 4 stroke 9.9. The 4 spring mount has made the heavy outboard much more enjoyable and very easy to adjust. The mainsail was showing quite a bit of wear.

After consulting with a couple of sailmakers, we decided to purchase a new laminate sail from Joe Waters. This change was a huge performance improvement. The headsail roller furler makes single-handling the boat very easy, as all controls have been run to the cockpit. We also sent the genoa to Sail Care for cleaning and reconditioning.

Two other big projects that were forced upon us were lowering the mast for repairs and replacing the windows. Unfortunately, one of the spreader retainer wires had come loose and damaged a small area on my genoa. My good friend Dan Fory helped me lower the mast using a gin pole and the mainsheet blocks. As with all sailboat projects, the repair escalated into running new mast lighting, including new wire and converting to all LEDs, replacing sheaves and, of course,

new spreader covers. The mast lights have been used a lot, as we enjoy going out at dusk. The window project was necessitated by the rather large leaks that had developed over the years. Again, relying on the expertise of Dan, we made new plexi-glass windows to properly fit the openings and then sealed the new windows. After two years they seem to be waterproof and holding well.

I often go back and forth between a dinghy and the Cat 25 for racing, but I generally like to use the Cat 25 for the long distance races. Last fall I decided to try out my whisker pole and attempted to set a wing on wing run. This is a move that I had not previously practiced, but had watched Mark and Chuck do. It looked easy enough. So after handing the tiller over

to Dan, I headed up on deck. In the excitement I had forgotten to tell Dan exactly what my plans were. While standing on the aft side of the mast, intently setting the whisker pole, I heard "watch out the boom is coming"! About that time I felt the boom push me toward the life line and I was sure I was going overboard. Fortunately, Dan caught the mainsheet in time. As I stood on the edge of the boat looking into the water, I decided that I had better walk before running, went back to the cockpit, and stayed off the deck the rest of the race. We have practiced, so watch out Mark and Chuck. We may be setting up a nice wing on wing this fall.



At this point (four years) in my sailing career I really enjoy both recreational cruising as well as racing. I will probably use "Mystic" mostly for recreational sailing and I am still searching for my ideal racing boat. The Mutt 15 has served me well for racing, but currently I am leaning strongly toward getting a Flying Scot for racing. Although, the Y-Flyer also seems like an intriguing boat with an incredible history.

One of my other goals has been to acquire some smaller dinghies and sell them, with the hope of increasing interest in sailing locally. So far I have sold a Mutt 15 to a new club member in Lexington, two Force 5s to new club members, a sunfish here in Rowan County and one in Bath County. Also, last weekend I was privileged to help a friend from Morehead set up and launch his first sailboat: a West Wight Potter 15. His whole family seems to be excited about sailing together.

It's hard to believe that it has already been four years since my maiden voyage in that old red Sunfish. I certainly regret that I didn't begin sooner. I find great enjoyment in continuing to develop

my skills and I truly love opportunities to introduce people to the sport of sailing.

That's my boat!

RC Sailing

We continue to sail at Jacobson Park Lake every Wednesday at 6:00 PM. Our numbers have grown to seven or eight regulars and we are represented by both ladies and gentlemen.

Our expertise in boat maintenance is increasing. Merritt Wade and Paul Duffin are great at knot tying and boat tuning. It is difficult for my 76 year old fingers to tie a tiny bowline! But I can replace your power switch, as mine has gone out TWICE!

Jacobson Park Lake, our racing venue, is beautiful, parking is convenient, and launching boats is made easy by the available dockage. RC participants are learning and gaining experience, but the lake has two shortcomings for sailboat racing:

1. It is not always possible to set a true upwind/downwind course, so we are unable to follow along with our boats as they near a mark.

2. Unlike other clubs, we do not have the ability to walk along with our boats to see if they have cleared the mark before committing to a turn. Trees along the shoreline impede walking

and visibility.

We would like to invite other clubs to race with us, but could not do this until these shortcomings have been addressed.

BAY BOATING COMMUNITY MOURNS TANGIER MARINA OWNER, 90

May 24, 2022

For years, boaters visiting Tangier Island first met Milton Parks, the genial owner of <u>Parks Marina</u> on the western end of the island's thoroughfare, the only facility in the community serving transient vessels.

Though the average vertical tide change in Tangier's thoroughfare is only 1.5', the current is powerful, and he knew every nuance of docking in it. With care, visitors would nose their vessels' bows into the slips as Parks stood ready to offer advice on gauging the correct angle of approach, take a line, and welcome them to the island. Parks, 90, died May 18, 2022. Except for several years in the U.S. Coast Guard Reserves, he lived on Tangier his whole life.

After graduating as valedictorian at Tangier Combined School (Class of 1948), an enduring source of pride

for him, he went to work in "the water business" like most of his male classmates, crabbing, oystering, and fishing for many years. He was, by common consent among his peers, one of the island's finest crabbers.

He and his wife Betty, who died in 2012, raised five daughters and sons who have built successful families of their own, both on and off the island. Their youngest daughter, Inez, is a degreed Physician's Assistant who helped found Tangier's Health Clinic and manages it today.

Years ago, Milton Parks saw opportunity in his family's shoreline, and with remarkable



energy, he built the marina in the evenings, after long days on the water. It is a simple facility, offering 25 slips, electric and water hookups, restrooms, and showers, with other facilities a short walk away in the town.

The marina atmosphere is laidback, exemplified by the owner's characteristic instructions, "If I'm not there to meet you, pull into any slip you like." Mr. Parks was always glad to see visitors, talk with them, and tell them stories of island life with his gentle, dry sense of humor. He was a great ambassador for the community.

In 2018, Virginia Beach-born photographer Mike Swartz produced this 12-minute <u>video</u> titled "Milton Parks-An American National Treasure" interviewing Mr. Parks about his beloved Tangier Island and the changes it has seen in the 21st century. In it, he recalls waking up at 2 a.m. six days a week to work the water. He says he chose the profession for the independence. He says he built the marina in the 1960s during the night after crabbing during the day.

The hope is that a Parks family member will continue operation of the marina.
