
than one session to cover this subject matter!

CRSA Club Boat News

The Executive Committee has recently approved my recommendation to replace the Hunter 235 in our fleet named the **Miss Kelley**. We acquired this Hunter 235 from Kevin Overbeck in 2009, at which time we paid \$2,200. She has served us for 13 years as an ASA 101 teaching platform and allowed many folks to gain valuable sailing experience as a club member rental boat. The naming rights for the Hunter 235 were purchased at auction by Paul and Susan Harbour, who named the boat after their daughter Kelley. The Miss Kelley on her trailer is now across from the Scott Creek Boat Ramp at Mrs. Hook's lot. We intend to sell the boat and trailer this season. She needs some love, but is a serviceable boat for someone who has the time to invest in minor repairs. She has a very good trailer, two mainsails and two headsails. No motor transfers with the boat. The boat is offered at \$1.500. We have a title for the boat and trailer. Contact me for more information about what Miss Kelley needs in the way of repairs.

A Catalina 22 will replace the Miss Kelley this spring. The Catalina 22 was graciously donated by Lee and Molly Sutherland. Look for information coming soon on how to acquire the naming rights to this new addition to our fleet.

New bench seats have been purchased for **Margaret Marry II**. These seats will make the boat more comfortable for folks on the Race Committee and during socials on the water. Life jackets will be stored in the seats, allowing for better access to our race equipment. A bow roller is to be added to the Margaret Mary, which will help with handling the anchor and rode.







Why should <u>YOU</u> race at Cave Run Lake? (And what stops you?)



First, let me begin by asking "Do you like Sailing"?

If you answer no, please skip this article and save your time. But if you love sailing, why not improve your skills? In my opinion, racing will enhance and strengthen your appreciation of sailing. You will grow in understanding and appreciate the awe and wonder of this sport of wind and water. Also, this knowledge will lead to an awareness of just how much you don't know about sailing and how you can improve.

Racing is the fastest way to improve your skills!

When you have a target or a mark and other sailors on the water to gauge how well you are doing, you can experience a direct truth of your understanding of the forces involved. When you race, the satisfaction of a good showing is reward enough. Notice that I did not say "winning". Knowing that you *and* your crew did your best leads to the celebration of a job well done.

Are you concerned that you will interfere with other boats because you don't know the rules?

You don't have a crew or your boat is inadequate or needs work?

You don't think you have the time because of family commitments?

The list goes on and these are all understandable reasons to skip a club race or regatta. I have to admit, I use them too often myself. But I ask, "What about the pursuit of excellence in sailing?" Does racing have any place in your life? I hope you can see that it does have a place. Often we deny or lower racing as a priority in our lives.

Here is how we can help!

This year, as in the past, several of the routine racers are willing to help you race.

If it means seminars on rules then let's schedule a time.

If you want someone on your boat to get you started let's make that happen.

If you need advice on how to make your boat faster or suggestions on improving your speed, let's work together to improve.

If you are intimidated by the chaos of the start of a race, let us know what we can do to help you get up to the starting line to begin your first race.

If your ego gets damaged by making a mistake, simply understand we all make mistakes!

Growth does not happen without errors. One usually learns best from mistakes. I trust you can see, we are seriously asking you to be more involved in improving your skills and we are here to support you.

Let me and others know how we can help you.

Helping other sailors means a lot to us in growing the fun of racing and we are sure you can benefit this year!

NEW STANDARD FOR PFD LABELING-LIFE JACKETS

The U.S. Coast Guard and Canada's PFD regulatory agency have joined together to create an approval system for Personal Flotation Devices (PFD's) that will apply in both countries. The old use of TYPE to categorize PFDs has been replaced by PERFORMANCE LEVELS.

Eventually all new life jackets which are Coast Guard approved will have the new labels/icons. PFDs with the new labeling have begun showing up in the market, but it will take several years for the old Type system to phase out. The biggest difference between the old TYPE and the new PERFORMANCE LEVEL is the marking and labeling information provided on the life jacket. Rather than referring to a PFD as TYPE I, II, III, IV and V, the new standard uses icons to show performance rating and intended use.

Three different types of icons will be found on the new Performance Label devices:

Performance Rating Icons – 50, 70, 100, 150 with an image indicating buoyancy.

The higher the number, the greater floatation.

Turning Performance Icons –showing a curved half circle indicating ability to roll a a face-up position. Devices 50 and 70 show a line through the circle icon indicating that the PFD has no self-turning ability. 100 shows a half circle indicating some self-turning ability. 150 for offshore waters shows full self-turning ability.

Usage Icons – show which activities the PFD is NOT suited for. The label will also state weight and chest size for proper sizing when purchasing a life jacket.

Approval conditions state that this device must be worn to be counted as equipment required by vessels meeting Transport Canada or USCG regulations.

Use:

Fasten all closures and adjust for a snug fit.

Inspection:

Inspect your life vest before each outing. Do not use if your life vest shows signs of weathering, damage, or rot

Care and Storage:

Dry thoroughly after each outing

Store in a dry, cool place out of direct sunlight.



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PERFORMANCE TYPE DEVICES:

Type I has the greatest buoyancy, 20 lbs, and can turn most unconscious persons from a facedown position in the water; generally for commercial use.

TYPE II was intended to turn some persons from facedown in the water to where breathing is not impeded. Buoyancy rating of 15.5 lbs. They are good for calm, inland waters or where there is a good chance for fast rescue; for general boating activities.

TYPE III flotation aides with a minimum of 15.5 lbs of buoyancy; not designed to turn an unconscious person face up, but are more comfortable for water sports.

TYPE IV are throwable devices with minimum 16.5 lbs of buoyancy; not designed to be worn.

TYPE V are special use devices not fitting into other categories. They must be used in accordance with requirements on the label.

PERFORMANCE LEVEL DEVICES:

LEVEL 50 is intended for use by competent swimmers who are near the bank or shore, who have help or a means of rescue. No self-turning ability.

LEVEL 70 intended for those who have help or rescue is close or are near to shore; minimally bulky but can't keep a person safe for long periods of time; use in calm waters; no self-turning ability. Equivalent to Type III

LEVEL 100 intended for those who may have to wait for rescue. Should not be used in rough waters. Some self-turning ability. High flotation.

LEVEL 150 intended for use with foul weather clothing. Will turn an unconscious person into a safe position. High flotation.

LEVEL 275 is primarily for off shore under extreme conditions.

Existing approved PFDs under the TYPE system are still legal as long as they are in good condition. However, PFDs approved under the old TYPE system are only legal in US waters.

No matter which PFD you chose, proper fitting and maintenance is important. Children should always wear a properly fitted PFD. Try them on for comfort and fit.

REMEMBER, THE BEST PFD IS THE ONE YOU WEAR!



All in all it was a great adventure and introduction to Cruising!




















That's My Boat

Each edition of the MainSHEET will feature a boat profile of a CRSA member.

Jim and Sharon Chandler, tell us about your boat!

When I was stationed in Charleston, SC in the Navy I saw people sailing on the harbor and thought that it looked like fun. So I bought a used 16 foot O'Day day sailor without knowing how to sail. I checked out a book on sailing from the local library and took it along with me on my first cruise. That was 45 years ago and it launched my sailing career.

After the 16 foot O'Day experience I purchased a 22 foot McGregor and sailed it on Cave Run Lake for 17 years. My next and current boat is a 2001 Hunter 260 that I also sail at Cave Run. When I saw this Hunter 260, brand new, at Strictly Sail in Cincinnati I caught a renewed case of boat fever. I made that purchase —- one that I have never regretted!

The Hunter is 26 feet which can be trailered, but is apparently large enough to require a permit to take it on the highway. Because it has a centerboard and water ballast it is easy to

load and launch.

Since I bought the boat new I have not had to perform a lot of maintenance on it. Once I made the mooring line too long and it wrapped around the centerboard and cracked it. That resulted in a \$2,000 repair, but fortunately it was covered by insurance. My other insurance claim came as a result of the roller furling jib getting blown out at the mooring during a storm, at a replacement cost of \$750. The main problem that I have experienced is not with the boat, but with the 9.8 horsepower Tohatsu engine. I could write a PhD thesis on keeping a 4 cycle outboard engine running.



I consider myself a recreational sailor. My fondest memories are times spent sailing with my wife, children and grandchildren over the years. With that said, I am thinking of trying racing in the future. People occasionally ask me if I ever think about purchasing another boat. I tell them that the Hunter 260 is a boat that I am very pleased with and surely the last boat that I will ever own.
