



LIFE MEMBERS BILL AND CHARLOTTE LUBAWY

OUR SAIILING LIFE

It's 1972/73. We have moved from OSU/Columbus, Ohio to Lexington and UK, for Bill's first and only job. Out of the blue, he says, "I would like to learn how to sail". This from a guy who does not swim, just actively sinks! When asking around about pursuing this, we were generally met with surprised looks, and the comment, "There's no sailing in Kentucky...we have mountains!" So the idea is put on the back shelf.

It's about 1977, and the Ken and Ilene Coffeen family, from Wisconsin, moves into the house behind us. Lo and behold, Ken brings a 40 year old, 19 ft. Mahogany Hulled Lightning sailboat, which is ideal for racing, but is not ideal for a young family, that does not like to deal with avoiding the swinging boom and fearing capsizing. Needless to say, the idea of learning to sail comes off the shelf.

Ilene offers to do childcare on land if we are willing to sail with Ken. We didn't need a second invitation. Off to Jacobson Park Lake to rehydrate the boat wood and to learn the basics. Then off to the recently filled Cave Run Lake for the start of our life of sailing.

Somewhere during this time, Ken learns about CRSA, and a life-time association with CRSA was formed. Bill remembers racing with Ken. I remember the socials and many lovely people, from all walks of life and personalities, that CRSA introduced us to.

It's 1981. Another neighbor uses an inheritance to buy a 20ft cruiser. Ken's older girls ask, "Why can't we have a boat like that?" This comment leads to our two families (now with 6 girls) purchasing the 22ft Venture Sailboat, naming it "Miss Adventure," We have "Miss Adventure" to this day.

For the next 10+ years, the emphasis was on raising our family of 3 girls and related activities, including Charlotte's 8 year commitment as a Girl Scout Brownie Leader, day camp volunteer, and leader-trainer. The sailing was mainly family



sailing, with some CRSA racing and, of course, those wonderful CRSA socials. In 1992 Bill began editing the CRSA Newsletter and we began to give back to the group that had given us so much. This first editing commitment lasted 5-6 years, during a time when our oldest, Carmalyn, was going off to college, Charlotte re-entered the workforce, and Bill's mother resided with us. He returned to the Newsletter editing position for 2001-2009 and 2012-2021. Because this put him in the "thick of things", he could see when something needed doing and, when he could, he would help get that done—including organizing a few banquets.

In 2004, Bill Lubawy joined Bill Jones teaching Beginning Sailing. Commitment to this endeavor continued through 2019, with help from many CRSA volunteers. When others in CRSA began offering ASA Classes, Beginning Sailing graduates could continue their education or go directly to the nationally accredited courses.

In 2001, and again in 2016, Bill took his turn at serving as Commodore. Charlotte served as Treasurer for 3 years when CRSA was desperate.

In 2012 Charlotte, having retired, and having a long history with the Wilderness Road Girl Scout

Council (WRGSC), organized a 5-day Sailing Class at Camp Judy Layne. Forty Scouts and Camp Counselors participated, using the WRGSC sailboats that had been given to the Camp by a benefactor. Twelve CRSA members volunteered that year, making this a real group effort. It became obvious that driving to and from the camp daily or staying in tents was not a viable long-term option. Steve Morris saved the day by providing the volunteers with housing at his cabin near the camp. The camp based Sailing program went on for years, till the WRGSC terminated the program because of lack of interest: a.k.a. lack of advertising AND modern options that pull young girls into so many other directions. Bill and I missed the camaraderie that came with living and working together with other CRSA volunteer instructors. Over the years, we have also helped with various Youth Sailing classes, including Boy Scout Sailing events, all organized by others.

We have gotten the most from our association with CRSA because we participated in everything, AND sailed, sailed! We enjoyed it all: sailing with the family, swimming off the boat, seeing fresh water jellyfish that only appear at the surface for a day or so, catching one small fish on a hook that had been left in the water overnight during one of our many sleep-overs on the lake, pulling the kids behind the boat on floats, sharing our love of sailing with visitors from many countries, racing during the regular race season and at the Annual Regattas, racing down the Lake to stay overnight on the Jett Set Houseboat, helping as race committee and as extra hands at the functions that followed, joining members at the lake to celebrate the solstice with a Sailstice, watching the sun, moon and planets rise and set, sailing under the full moon in the quiet of the night, helping with odd jobs like keeping the storage unit from being overgrown, checking that the tarps stayed over the boats stored nearby, being greeted by Mrs. Hook almost every time we were at our boat and having her ask about the family, and reminiscing about when our girls were young. Another thrill was going on sailing trips, organized by other CRSA members: Memorial Day weekend trips to the Chesapeake, and week(s) long trips to the North Channel of Lake Huron, to the BVIs, to Key West, to Italy, to Croatia, and to Spain for the Americas Cup Races. We would never have done these on our own. What good friends were made on these trips! And these experiences encouraged us to do some sailing adventures on our own. We went to Auckland, New Zealand for an Americas Cup Race, touring both Islands, then to San Francisco one year for Cup Trials, and another for the actual Race. We joined a group in Maine for a week of sailing and a week on land, during which we saw many lighthouses, ate 17 lobsters and had blueberry beer. We spent many Christmas vacations in Florida, day-sailing in the Keys, with occasional snorkeling trips, and a visit to the Miami Boat Show. During one of these trips, Bill and Carmalyn (who regularly sails/races on San Francisco Bay) took a two-day spinnaker handling class with J-World out of Key West in 20+ mph winds.

Without the contributions of hundreds of CRSA members over the years, none of this would have been possible, so any help we have given to CRSA is just saying thanks to them.

LIFE MEMBERS AL AND RUTH LAWTON

Al Lawton's Story

In 1963 I took a position as Forest Ranger for Rowan County and watched the formation and development of Cave Run Lake.

From 1967 to 1979 I departed Central Kentucky for a sojourn in Louisville and the family business.

In 1979 I returned to Lexington and met Charlie and Beth Jett, who invited Ruth and me to a Thistle Measuring Party and introduced us to CRSA. We CRSA joined right away. We purchased a 17-foot Celebrity day-sailer and participated in the Spring and Fall series. We also attended classes on racing rules, sail trim, and navigation.

My involvement in the club expanded, when in 1986 I accepted the position of Membership Chairman and served for several years. During this period membership increased. The club logo was designed during this period, and the first order of club burgees was purchased and offered for sale in the ship's chandlery.

Then in 1988 I accepted the position of Vice Commander, supported the Commander, and organized the Fall Regatta.


From 1989 and thereafter, my role continued to expand. In 1989 I was elected Commander. By this time, the racing, education, and membership programs were well organized and operating smoothly. We had stalwart volunteers in the leadership positions. Social events at the lake were standard following each race and the Annual Meeting became a formal affair. But we needed something else. I shared my thoughts about giv-

ing back to the community in a charitable way. The idea caught on quickly, and the first Charity Regatta Fund Raiser was organized for the benefit of the Speech and Hearing Center.

I served more than one term as Commander, though not sequentially. The club continued to grow, and new opportunities presented themselves. In addition to the daysailer I acquired a 24-foot Helms which I kept at the lake. The first Spring Charter Cruise on the Chesapeake Bay was organized. I was not the organizer, but I was the first to sign up to attend!

There have been two pivotal events in my sailing life. The first was meeting Charlie Jett and CRSA. The second was meeting the Chesapeake Bay. Within a year of the first Chesapeake cruise, I purchased my first blue water boat, a 28-foot Cape Dory. That is correct, in case anyone is counting, the Lawton Fleet expanded to three sailing vessels and a canoe.

Sailing during the decade of the 1990's was divided between Cave Run Lake and Chesapeake Bay. The 28-foot tiller steered Cape Dory proved to be too small and was quickly replaced with a spacious 33-foot Cape Dory. *SarahGay* carried 80-gallons of potable water, was



equipped with fully functional galley, and accommodations for a Captain and crew of three. Education courses were expanded to include additional navigation, engine maintenance, electricity, radar, and radio. CRSA continued its Chesapeake cruises. I was pleased to participate in the organizing and planning of these outings. The three berths on *SarahGay* were included with those available on the charter vessels, which allowed for greater number of participants without increasing the cost.

By the turn of the century the daysailer and the Helms 24 found new owners and my blue water sailing increased in earnest. On various occasions *SarahGay* and crew sailed as far south as the Dominican Republic and as far north as the Canadian Maritime Provinces and Nova Scotia. Other excursions included numerous trips in the inland water way to Florida a jaunt to Key West and overwinter at Key Largo, night-time crossing the Gulf Stream to the Bahamas, and Caribbean cruises through the British Virgin Islands and the Windward Islands.

Though competitive racing and lake sailing are no longer options, CRSA remains a strong social center in my life. For ten years Ruth and I have been pleased to make our home the gathering place for the CRSA Social. As soon as Covid is under control, we look forward to doing that again. Through CRSA I have made the best friends and enjoyed the best adventures any man could ask for!

Ruth Lawton's Story

I joined CRSA at the same time as Al. I was a born land-lover. Open boats that rocked in the water were not my friend. Competitive racing tended to bring out my worst anxieties. So, I decided to participate in the beginning sailing class taught by the club. I memorized and used the proper names for the various parts of the boat and the rigging, learned the parts of the sail, the sheets and the lines and how they

operated, and some sail trim. I was cautioned, repeatedly, **there are no ropes on a sailing vessel**. Each thing that appears to be made of rope has a proper name. It will always be referred to by its proper name. You will not become confused and do the wrong thing if you use the proper name!

From all outward appearances, it looked like things were going well until, in the heat of competition, rounding the last buoy, with the boat healed over, water splashing over the gunnels, the Captain shouted an order. "Pull that ROPE!" Anxiety set in! When the order was repeated, with vehemence, I returned in kind, "You know there are no ropes on a



boat. What in "bleep" do you want me to do?" With one great lurching movement the Captain stood up, reached forward, and adjusted the boom vang the way he wanted it. To this day, I am convinced that everyone on the lake that day heard me. The crew on the boat that was trying to crowd us at the buoy laughed so hard they accidently gave us enough buoy room to slip by ahead of them.

On the way back to the dock, I had a long talk with myself. If my decorum did not improve, no one would board a boat if I were on it. Fortunately, I was able to recruit three women friends from CRSA to attend a one-week offshore sailing school in Florida. The vessel was a 46-foot Peterson named "Womanship". The course was titled "Sail Yourself Safely Home". Upon boarding, the Captain (a woman) guided the students in an exercise to determine what each student wanted to accomplish during the week. The course was a success. It was the best thing I ever did for myself. I know if I wanted to go along, I had to get along. When I learned how to have confidence in the boat and in the crew that I was with, the anxiety took care of itself.

My first leadership position with CRSA was Treasurer. I was good with figures, and no one wanted the job. So, I ended up being Treasurer for about 10 years. Then one day the Nominating Chairman called and said it was time for CRSA to have its first woman Commodore. I immediately said "No", but Charlie Jett never took no for an answer. The club membership was about 140 families, and the activities were well established and managed, from the Spring Racing Season to the Grand Annual Regatta and the

November Annual Meeting, from the newsletter to the ship's store. As Commodore, I just needed to conduct, to assure everyone that we were in concert with our agreed upon calendar of activities.

I have collaborated with volunteers in many different organizations. I am enthusiastic about how we recognized their contributions and how this sets the standards for participation in the organization. The Executive Committee and I spend time evaluating the awards. In addition to the racing awards, the club had several membership awards which generally recognized new/newer member' contributions. These awards were given only once to the same person. The club had nothing that recognized continuous or lifetime service. Thus, the Charles H. Jett, III Award was established.

Thanks to CRSA I had the opportunity to learn to sail and to enjoy it. Thanks to Al Lawton, I have seen the sunrise over the Atlantic Ocean after a night's run across the Gulf Stream, seen a school of dolphins racing with the bow of our boat, cruised the Bahamas, BVI and the Windward Islands in the Caribbean, cruised the New England coast from Bar Harbor to New York City, traveled the inland waterway from Annapolis to Ft. Lauderdale, and spent twenty-five years "gunkholing" on Chesapeake Bay.

CRSA Minor Structural Repair and Finishing of Fiberglass Hulls Class Open for Registration!

This will be a hands-on intensive class, where you will learn to make minor structural repairs, including bulkhead tabbing, as well as how to refinish a gel coat hull.

The boats to be repaired are the Cave Run Youth Sailing Program's sunfish – enabling our youth sailing program to continue into another season.

That's My Boat

Each edition of the MainSHEET will feature a boat profile of a CRSA member.

Steve Morris, tell us about your boat!

I have been sailing for over 30 years. My first sailboat was a 15 ft. wooden daysailer that I found in my aunt's garage. It turned out to be a Sam Rabl "Titmouse" and it was the boat that got me hooked.

I currently sail a 1990 Hunter 27-2 named "Slightly Soaked". It is a fractional sloop rigged mono-hull with an inboard diesel engine. She was originally docked on Kerr Lake in North Carolina, where I went for a shakedown cruise and then promptly moved her to Cave Run Lake where I keep a slip at Scott Creek Marina.

The boat is 27' long, has a 9' beam, and draws 3.5' of water with a fixed wing keel. The boat has a Yanmar 1GM10 (9HP) diesel engine for auxiliary power.

The sail plan is a typical fractional sloop arrangement with a mainsail and a roller furling genoa. A few years ago I bought a new mainsail and genoa from Unbridled Sailing. The only additional equipment that I've added is a VHF radio, a digital depth finder, a Magma grill, and a solar panel. The boat came very well equipped when I bought it in 2010.

Since the boat has an inboard engine it is necessary to routinely change the engine oil and oil and fuel filters. In the Fall I winterize the engine, water system, and waste system, using propylene glycol based antifreeze. In the Spring this process is reversed. Beyond that, maintenance consists of routinely cleaning the boat and checking all the standing and running rigging and making repairs as necessary. Every two or three

years I pull the boat out of the hull cleaned and painted paint.

SLICHTLY

At heart, I am a recreational cruiser. My wife Diana and I like the laid back atmosphere of ghosting along quietly with other boats on the lake. Since I am perpetually afflicted with "3 feet- itis", I always want a boat 3 feet longer than the one I have. But I have recently come to the realization that the boat I have now is just right. With that said, I still check the cruising boat "For Sale" ads every day.

Just in case one boat is not enough, I also have two extras: a 1982 O'Day Daysailer II, that is a 17 'sloop rigged, centerboard boat that I use whenever the opportunity arises; and a 2011 Avalon 25 foot pontoon boat moored at Scott Creek Marina for grandkid outings.

That's my boat!
