Good Times at the February Trip Tales

Social Chair Ted Brandewie arranged a great February Trip Tales with a program focusing on sailing at Cave Run Lake. About 30 CRSA members and many newcomers attended.

Ted began the program with everyone introducing themselves, indicating if they had a boat and if so what it was, and to describe their best sailing experience. Many interesting comments came forward regarding the best experiences.

Ted then displayed a map of Cave Run on the large monitor and pointed out the bald eagle nesting areas, Tacker's Alley and why it has that name, and individuals pointed out their favorite anchoring areas and why.

Al Lawton had many fascinating comments about the start of sailing on Cave Run. Al was a forest ranger for Kentucky at Morehead before the damn was built. The US Forest Service planned for fishing on the lake, but not sailing; that's why they left so many submerged trees in place along the channels going to Longboat Marina, and in other tributaries. It was for fish habitats and not (as many of us suspected) to save money. IBM'ers discovered the winds were pretty good on the lake and sailing began. CRSA has had to be an advocate for sailboats to be accommodated, for instance not having power lines strung across the ramps or between the various launching areas, aligning the light poles so the arms paralleled the ramps rather than going across them, and getting the trees trimmed along the ramps and parking lots.

David Duncan described going up in a helicopter and seeing the geography that affects the lake winds. The lack of hills to the west a north allows the prevailing winds coming from Cincinnati and Louisville to provide good sailing conditions. But, because the topography changes at the lake from open plains to rolling hills, we also get the swirly and less regular winds. Jim Dinger described some of the geology of the area.

The program was so informative several CRSA Officers thought others could benefit from the discussion. So, we have scheduled a repeat at the Spring Social at Al & Ruth's home which will include more about the history of the lake and of CRSA.

Ted cooked a family favorite recipe with 12 pounds of Thai pork in 2 crockpots. The meal got wonderful reviews; all part of where the CRSA dues go.

Harbor Master Report on Miss Kelly CRSA Board Votes to Sell

At the last CRSA Board Meeting the Board voted to sell the Miss Kelly. This came on the heels of the 2015 Audit Committee reviewing our finances, noting the financial losses involved with keeping Miss Kelly and recommending taking a very serious look at whether the loss was worth it. In the last several years CRSA purchased a new mainsail and cover, a new motor, and a new tiller, then had to have the motor repaired as a result of what seems like someone adding water to the gas tank. After a considerable discussion the Board voted to continue to use the boat for rentals and CRSA events, but to look for a buyer. To complicate any transfer a buyer can keep the slip holding Miss Kelly but the Marina just instituted a high fee to transfer the slip to a new renter. Certainly something CRSA prefers would not have happened.

The CRSA Board would appreciate any comments on the sell decision and whether a replacement would be appropriate. If a members a feel a different type of boat would be good please indicate what type you would prefer. Miss Kelly Cleaning and Wish List From The Harbor Master

Earlier this spring Harbor Master Lou Trost moved Miss Kelly to Mrs. Hook's Boat Yard for cleaning. On a not too nice afternoon in March Lou and Lee Sutherland took Lee's pressure washer and cleaned the hull. See pictures following.

The Harbor Master is looking for some help getting the Miss Kelly ready to sail as long as we own her, and hopefully to attract a good buyer. On the wish list for Miss Kelly from your Harbor Master is help to:

- Stain and varnish of the exterior wood trim

Cut some new companion way hatch boards. The dimensions of the companion way are 31"inches across the top and 22 and 3/16 inches across the bottom by 24" inches high. Lou suggests a split at the half way mark, 12 inches, which will produce two hatch boards. Or three splits of about 8 inches each. If the boards were cut about ³/₄ of an inch longer, and the joining surfaces slanted so that water flowing over them does not leak into the boat would be best. Do we have any wood workers in need of a spring project?
Cleaning the interior cushions.

- Cleaning some small spots on the mainsail.

- Cleaning the interior (might be easier after the boat is back in the slip).

CRSA will cover the cost of supplies for these projects. Please contact Lou for more information and indicate your willingness to help, and also to let him answer questions if you have any. Contact Lou Trost the CRSA Harbor Master at

Lou is trying to have all this completed by April 30th the last day of the month, and the boat returned to the slip. All offers of assistance will be appreciated. A few volunteers are already willing to begin. Let's join together and make 2016 a great year on Cave Run Lake.

I have used what I have learned here to good advantage in travels to other venues for various regional and national events, occasionally with notable success, but always with an appreciation of the great benefits the sport and the experience it provides.




