


DO YOU KNOW THE MEANING OF THIS SAILING TERM?

Why should <u>YOU</u> race at Cave Run Lake? (And What Stops You?)



First, let me begin by asking "Do you like Sailing"?

If you answer no, please skip this article and save your time. But if you love sailing, why not improve your skills? In my opinion, racing will enhance and strengthen your appreciation of sailing. You will grow in understanding and appreciate the awe and wonder of this sport of wind and water. Also, this knowledge will lead to an awareness of just how much you don't know about sailing and how you can improve.

Racing is the fastest way to improve your skills!

If it means seminars on rules then let's schedule a time.

If you want someone on your boat to get you started let's make that happen.

If you need advice on how to make your boat faster or suggestions on improving your speed, let's work together to improve.

If you are intimidated by the chaos of the start of a race, let us know what we can do to help you get up to the starting line to begin your first race.

If your ego gets damaged by making a mistake, simply understand we all make mistakes!

Growth does not happen without errors. One usually learns best from mistakes. I trust you can see, we are seriously asking you to be more involved in improving your skills and we are here to support you.

Let me and others know how we can help you.

Helping other sailors means a lot to us in growing the fun of racing and we are sure you can benefit this year!



Don't Let This Happen To Your Boat!

With the long cold winter coming to an end and sailing season upon us now, most of our thoughts are probably centered around getting our boats cleaned, rigged, and ready for our first sail of the year. You might think that it's an odd time to be talking about winterizing your boat, but over this past winter two beautiful sailboats sank in their slips at Scott Creek because they were not properly winterized last fall.

It appears that the culprit in both of these sinkings was the failure of through hull fittings. Through hull fittings are passageways through the hull of the boat, usually below the waterline, that allow for the intake of lake water or the discharge of various drain waters from the boat. If any of these fittings fail while the boat is in the water, especially during the cold winter months, the results can be catastrophic. By the time someone would realize that a through hull is broken or leaking, it may be too late to save the boat from sinking.

To decrease the probability of a through hull failure, it is important that several steps be taken every fall as you winterize the boat for the season.





- Carefully inspect your boat to be sure that you have identified all through hull fittings. Some of these fittings may be located in difficult to find places.
- Inspect the fitting where it goes through the hull to be sure that there is no leaking around the seal. If any leaking is found, make sure that you take whatever steps are necessary to stop it.
- Operate the shut off valve to be sure that it is fully opening and closing without leaking through. If a problem with a valve is found, then it must be repaired or replaced. Once that has been done, then close the valve tightly.
- Either fully drain the lines above the shut off valve or fill them with an environmentally accepted antifreeze that will protect them down to -20 degrees F. Be especially careful to fill any glass or plastic strainers to prevent them from rupturing.
- Even though these steps have been taken, it is important to visually inspect your boat periodically during the winter months. You may find a small leak that can be easily repaired before a disaster occurs. You must accept the responsibility that no one else is going to check on your boat.

While the main point of this article is to deal with leaks and failures of through hull fittings, there are many other systems in your boat that need to be addressed during winterization. These would include such things as inboard engine maintenance and freeze protection, water system drainage, battery maintenance, sail storage, etc. We usually find ourselves winterizing our boats at the very last minute when the weather may be bad. In order that we not forget any of the important steps, I would suggest that you have a physical boat winterization checklist that you follow to assure that everything gets done. You can find may excellent checklists on line and an internet search may help you find one that is just right for the needs of your individual boat.

I would hate to see anyone end up losing their boat because these simple steps weren't taken. Additionally you may find that if your boat sinks, your insurance company may refuse to pay a claim if you can't prove that you did the necessary maintenance to prevent this occurrence.

Cruise News

CRSA currently has three trips in the works:

• The Seychelles trip, October 7th thru 14th 2023. This cruise is currently full. Cancellations are not unusual, and we make every effort to fill those spots. If you are interested, let Merritt Wade know and you can be put on a waiting list.



• Exumas Cruise, January 20th thru 27th 2024. We will be using monohull boats for this cruise. There are currently three full boats, and we are working on a fourth. The boats are three to four cabins each. We will fly into Nassau and pick up the boats there and then head over 33 nautical miles to the Exumas island chain. There are many islands in the chain, some with towns and marinas and some remote and uninhabited. In-



cluded is the Exuma Cays Land and Sea Park - a special place. The Island chain is 100 miles long, but we will only cover part of it.



The cost to CRSA members is \$1,116.00 per person based on double occupancy per cabin. This will cover all boat related expenses, not including food. A deposit of \$500.00 per person is needed to book your spot on this trip, first come first served. An up-to-date CRSA membership is required. Make checks payable to CRSA.

Barcelona Spain for Americas Cup races, October 2024. This trip is in the
planning stages and no reservations are being taken yet. The goal of the trip is
to include sailing and a close-up view of the races. There will be a village set
up at the docks with entertainment, dining, and trade shows. Stay tuned for
more information.

A lot of work was accomplished and assistance given when needed to get the most out of our time together. Many boat issues were addressed. A special thanks goes to Paul Duffin and Merritt Wade for their expertise in putting the Dragon Force 65 in proper sailing condition.

We conducted two "fun days" of racing on April 19th and 26th. Because the lake at Jacobson Park was very low due to ramp work, we held our races at other locations those days. These races were not scored in the official race series.

Our official race series begins May 3rd at 6:00 at Jacobson Park. No race will begin before 6:00.

Several of our RC sailors also have boats they sail at Cave Run Lake, so it doesn't have to be either/or—you can sail both types of vessels. RC sailing is a great way to sail on Wednesday evenings without driving out of Lexington.

Kristen Neuschafer from South Africa wins the Golden Globe Race 2022 in 233d 18h 43m 47s!

Who is Kristen Neuschafer And what is the Golden Globe Race?

Kirsten has been a sailor since childhood, but turned it into a profession in 2006. From boat deliveries to crewing she built a diverse set of skills in the sailing arena. Before the Golden Globe Race in 2018, Kirsten's longest solo sailing trip was a delivery from Portugal to South Africa on an old and maintenance-intensive 32-foot ferro-cement sloop, using only a wind-vane for self-steering.

Kirsten becomes the first woman to win an around the world race via the three great capes!

At 19:43:47 on Thursday the 27th, Minnehaha crossed the GGR finish line before going up a channel lit in red, where the people of Les Sables gave her the warm welcome she deserved for coming first in the grueling GGR 2022-2022. She had spent 235 days at sea, with an official time of 233 days, 18 hours, 43 minutes and 47 seconds after her 35 hours of compensation awarded for Taplo's rescue were discounted, and no fuel penalty since she only consumed 30.7 litres of fuel in her round-the-world voyage.

WHAT IS THE GOLDEN GLOBE RACE (ASA.COM)

The Golden Globe Race is a solo, nonstop yacht race around the world with no assistance and without the use of modern technology. The original Golden Globe Race was the first race around the world solo without stops or any outside assistance. The race was organized by the Sunday Times newspaper in Great Britain and was held in 1968. The race was inspired by Sir Francis Chichester's successful single-handed circumnavigation of the globe in his yacht Gipsy Moth!V.

A Few Facts About The Golden Globe Race:

- Entrants are limited to sailing similar yachts and equipment to what was available to Sir Robin in that first race.
- Competitors must sail in production boats between 32 ft and 36 ft overall (9.75-10.97m) designed prior to 1988 that have a full-length keel with a rudder attached to their trailing edge.
- The challenge is pure and very raw, placing adventure ahead of winning at all costs.
- Competitors will be navigating with sextant only.

The 1968 Golden Globe Race was won by Sir Robin Knox-Johnston, who completed the race in just over 312 days. The race has been reborn with a round-the-world race held in 2018, attempting to capture the nature of those early intrepid sailors. The 2018 event was a success, inspiring the current edition in September 2022.

The Golden Globe Race is one of the most challenging sailing races in the world. The sailors must navigate their way around the world without any outside assistance and without using modern technology such as GPS or satellite phones. They must rely on traditional navigation methods such as sextants and paper charts. The sailors must also deal with extreme weather conditions such as storms and high seas. They must be self-sufficient for months at a time, carrying all their food and supplies on board their yachts.
